

Does Mauritania have solar?

TOUJOUNINE - Solar Averaging seven days of rain a year, Mauritania's climate is ideal for solar and the country's first major development in the sector did not disappoint in this regard with 54,000 panels supporting 50 MW production capacity at Toujounine, on the northern outskirts of the nation's capital.

As Mauritania leads in west Africa's green energy transition, significant investment is being made in hydrogen, solar and wind energy developments.

Who owns Mauritania's electricity plant?

Completed in 2017, the \$53 million plant is run by the national electricity company, Sociéte Mauritanienne d'Electricité (Somelec), and has seen ongoing works since its inauguration by (then) President Mohamed Ould Abdel Aziz, removing an estimated 57,000 tonnes of CO₂ per annum and supplying 10% of Mauritania's net energy production.

In 2019, Mauritania's energy mix was dominated by oil products (65%) and biofuels and waste (32%). In 2020, 43% of the population had access to clean cooking which is the highest share in West Africa. In 2020, 47% of the population had access to electricity. For electricity access, the country targets universal access in urban areas and ...

Mauritania aims to become a major player in the hydrogen industry by 2040. In May 2021, Mauritania signed a memorandum of understanding with a renewable energy developer, CWP Global, for the development of a USD 40bn project with the aim to produce 30 gigawatts of wind and solar energy to power electrolyers for the production of green hydrogen.⁸

The African Development Fund has approved \$302.9 million of financing for a 225 kV electricity interconnection project linking Mauritania and Mali. The project is part of the Desert to Power ...

Mauritania has a high density of solar energy over the entire area of the country and also has strong wind energy, in addition to the presence of groundwater in abundance, which means that the basic elements are available, and the technology remains to exploit these resources as well. Mauritania, with its abundant wind and solar energy, has committed to the African Green Hydrogen Alliance and the UN's High-Level Champions for Climate Action. In May 2021, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed to develop the 30GW AMAN green hydrogen project, which is estimated to increase the country's GDP by 50% by 2030.
